- You find a suspicious package, actions?
- LSA, lifebuoys, line throwing apparatus, pyro and especially the launching of the davit launched TEMPSC, Leggett was super keen on the answers I gave in regards to LSA. For the lifeboat he wanted the full procedure from sounding the alarm to launching and retrieval of the lifeboat as well as equipment carried inside. Got hung up on this for a while as I was missing the major point of look over the side before launching in my first explanation. However Leggett gave me a chance to redeem myself and got it in the end, however he did make me resight the process again until he was confident that I knew what I was doing. (I blame nerves...)
- What is a hydrometer, how to use and for what reasons?
- What was the FWA on my last vessel? Didn't ask for DWA formula but gave him it any way.

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- How many Decks on the vessel?
- Ventilation requirements on car decks?
- Maintenance on car decks and workings of water tight doors (Safety checks i.e. locking pins in place, indicators for watertight/gas tight doors
- Where are the CO2 tanks stored for the fixed fire fighting on board and how to operate?
- Duties of OOW on deck watch?
- How to perform a safe navigational watch?
- What would you expect in the handover of a navigation watch?
- How would you passage plan on ECDIS, a little on the set up of ECDIS and inputs?
- Set up of RADAR and inputs?
- I am on watch; Man overboard, portside... actions?
- Quizzed a little on GMDSS i.e. what message for MOB difference between designated and undesignated distress
- Showed me a HRU and asked me to identify the parts as well as the operation
- Bit of an odd ball this one but he asked me what the boiler was for on ship? This question came about from an answer id given in a ROR situation where I mentioned slowing down.
  Wasn't entirely sure what he was wanting for this because I wasn't 100%

sure on the boiler apart from it heated water. The answer he was looking for and what I eventually got onto saying was that it is used to heat the Heavy Fuel Oil for the main engine.

- Asked what is in the Code of Safe working practice? Gave a bit of a speech on a few chapters and seemed happy with that.
- Elements of risk assessment?
- What are the duties of 3<sup>rd</sup> officer when coming into port on the aft mooring station?

## P/D vessel; port side; ROC exists; action?

- P/D vessel; stbd side; ROC exists; action?
- ✤ Grilled me on Rule 5, 6, 7, 13 & 18
- Definition of vessel engaged in fishing?
- Definition of vessel Restricted in Ability to Maneuver?
- Gave me smartie board with a single green light? Port side ROC exists action?
- Gave me vessel at anchor directly ahead on smartie board ROC exists asked for action?
- Fog signals for sailing vessel, P/D underway, vessel aground and vessel at anchor.
- Visibility anchor light?
